The purpose of the Oregon Fire District Directors Association "District of the Year" award is to recognize Districts that have distinguished themselves either through implementation of creative programs to serve the public, heighten the awareness of fire safety in their communities, or have gone above and beyond in serving and promoting the fire service causes both in their own communities and across the state.

"In difficult and uncertain times, the willingness of a District to share of its resources for the benefit of firefighters across the state is truly remarkable," said OFDDA President Connie Barton, "But the 2009 District of the Year did just that."

Jackson County Fire District #3 took the initiative to provide instructors for volunteer firefighter training during the recent OVFA Conference at no cost, provided free use of its training facility, and paid its career staff overtime to cover the open shifts left by front line firefighters who will instruct the classes.

The District also went into its own community for sponsorship funding, generating well over \$10,000.00 in conference savings, enabling registration fees to be lowered from \$225.00 down to \$125.00 per firefighter. ◆

EMT-I Survey Request

There has been a great deal of chatter in the past while regarding the Oregon EMT-I scope of practice, new curriculum and the possible changes ahead in 2012 that may be proposed to bring Oregon alongside the National Registry guidelines.

With all this discussion it seems as if we EMT-I's have not really had the opportunity to voice our feelings about the changes that have occurred and may occur in the future. As such, I have compiled a survey in order compile responses from other intermediates in the state regarding the current scope of practice and other issues that pertain to what we do for our patients here in Oregon. The results of this survey will be presented to the Oregon Medical Board EMT Advisory Committee (of which I am a member) at the next meeting in Portland in late August.

For those who do not know me, let me give you a little background information. I am a volunteer EMT-I in Eastern Oregon, running with a crew of volunteer EMT-B's and first responders. We typically have long transport times, do not run with a paramedic on board and our closest hospital is 60 miles away in John Day. We respond to an average of 60 calls a year so I definitely know what it is like to go for spells without the pager going off, the challenges of maintaining our skills and confidence, keeping up with continuing education requirements. I have been an

EMT-I for the past 9 years, am an EMT instructor, was on the committee that rewrote the current curriculum, currently sit on the OMB-EMT Advisory Committee and have a passion for EMS.

Two years ago the state DHS/EMS office indicated that they were going to send a survey to all EMT-I's in Oregon. The survey was supposed to gauge how intermediates were feeling about the new scope of practice. Unfortunately this survey never materialized and has subsequently been put in a "parking lot". I feel it is VERY important that we EMT-Is have a chance to express our opinions. That is why I have put together this survey and share it with the other members on the EMT Advisory Committee, the state EMS office and folks who attend the meetings. This survey is strictly for intermediates in Oregon and I would like to gather as many responses from across the state as possible so that frontier to urban voices are heard.

Please contact me directly to obtain a copy of the survey. Email is preferred, although I can post a copy to you if you wish. The deadline to return completed surveys to me is August 15th. I will compile a synopsis for presentation at the next OMB meeting and am happy to send a copy to everyone who responds.

I greatly appreciate everyone's assistance in this matter and please feel free to contact me anytime if you have questions.

Second would be discussion and update on any major issues facing the fire district. Third, review the new As a new director, make sure you understand the limited role you play. You have authority only when meeting as a board, and voting with a majority (fire districts require three (3) affirmative votes to pass any issue, regardless of the number of directors at the meeting). Districts,

unlike other units of government, especially cities and counties, are limited in what activities and services are available for their patrons. Those limitations for fire districts are addressed in ORS Chapter 478, which I recommend you peruse.

This is a good time for all boards to review the board policies, as well as agendas and how information is provided to the board. Review and update your short- and long-range planning goals.

Make sure your board has a copy of the Attorney General's Public Meetings Manual available. Before going into executive session, carefully verify that the topic is subject to executive session.

Congratulations to all of you new members, re-elected members, and continuing members.

Records Management Procedures

July 1st each year brings a close of fiscal business for Oregon Fire Districts. It seems appropriate to take brief look at the State mandated requirements for retention of district records.

How do you find out what the requirements are?

- 1 Go online to www.Oregon.gov
- 2 Select State Agencies
- 3 Open Archives Division
- 4 Click on Records management
- 5 Then Records Retention Schedules
- 6 Choose Counties and Special Districts
- 7- This should open General Records Retention Schedule. The General Records Retention Schedule is 152 pages in length (some are blank due to rule changes etc.) You may wish to add this reference to your Favorites web sites.

The Purpose of the rules:

Page 3 states "the purpose these rules is to implement the provisions of ORS 192.005 to 192.170 and ORS 357.825 to 357.895 by providing orderly retention and disposition of public records, regardless of medium or physical format; standards for appropriate use of microfilm and digital imaging; standards for the protection and storage of public records; and rules for the use of State Archives, State Records Center, and Security Copy Depository. General Records Retention Schedules published as a part of these rules provide state and

local agencies with the lawful authority to destroy or otherwise dispose of commonly occurring public records."

Who is your Records Officer?

Appointment of Records Officer 166-030-0016 — on page 11 — states "To establish a records management program to insure orderly retention and destruction of all public records, and to insure the preservation of public records of value, each state and local agency should designate a Records Officer to organize and coordinate records storage scheduling, retirement, and destruction. The State Archivist will provide training and assistance for Records Officers."

Where to begin:

The General Records Section begins with a Table of Contents and Fire and Emergency Medical rules are 166-150-0115 on pages 80-84.

Other rules may also apply to Fire District records

Some examples:

Page 76 addresses the retention of Grant Records.

Minimum retention:

- a) Retain final reports from significant grants ... Permanently
- b) Retain records documenting the purchase and/or disposal of real property: 10 years...
- c) Retain other grant records: 3 years after annual or final expenditure report and approved or, as specified in grant agreement – which ever is longer.



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 d) Retain unsuccessful grant applications: 1 year after rejection or withdrawal.

On page 140 Safety Inspection and Compliance Records are addressed in section (16) and Safety Program Records are the subject of section (17).

If you are in doubt about retain records please refer to the Administrative Rule or contact the Archives Division. ◆
